The British Pacific Fleet (BPF) had been activated in November 1944, replacing the Eastern Fleet. Most significantly the BPF struck oil targets in Sumatra in January 1945. But as the war drew closer to Japan, the Royal Navy's carriers offered a capability that U.S. planners could not ignore.

Subsequently the British Pacific Fleet (BPF) was formed on 22 November 1944 under Admiral Sir Bruce Fraser. The combined orders of battle of the British Eastern Fleet (just finished invading Burma and en-route to invading Malaya), and the British Pacific Fleet (assembling in Australia or fighting off the coast of Japan) at the time of the Japanese surrender was about 700 ships (with more en-route from Europe). This included 6 battleships, 35 aircraft carriers, 23 cruisers, 42 submarines, and over 200 destroyers and escorts.
